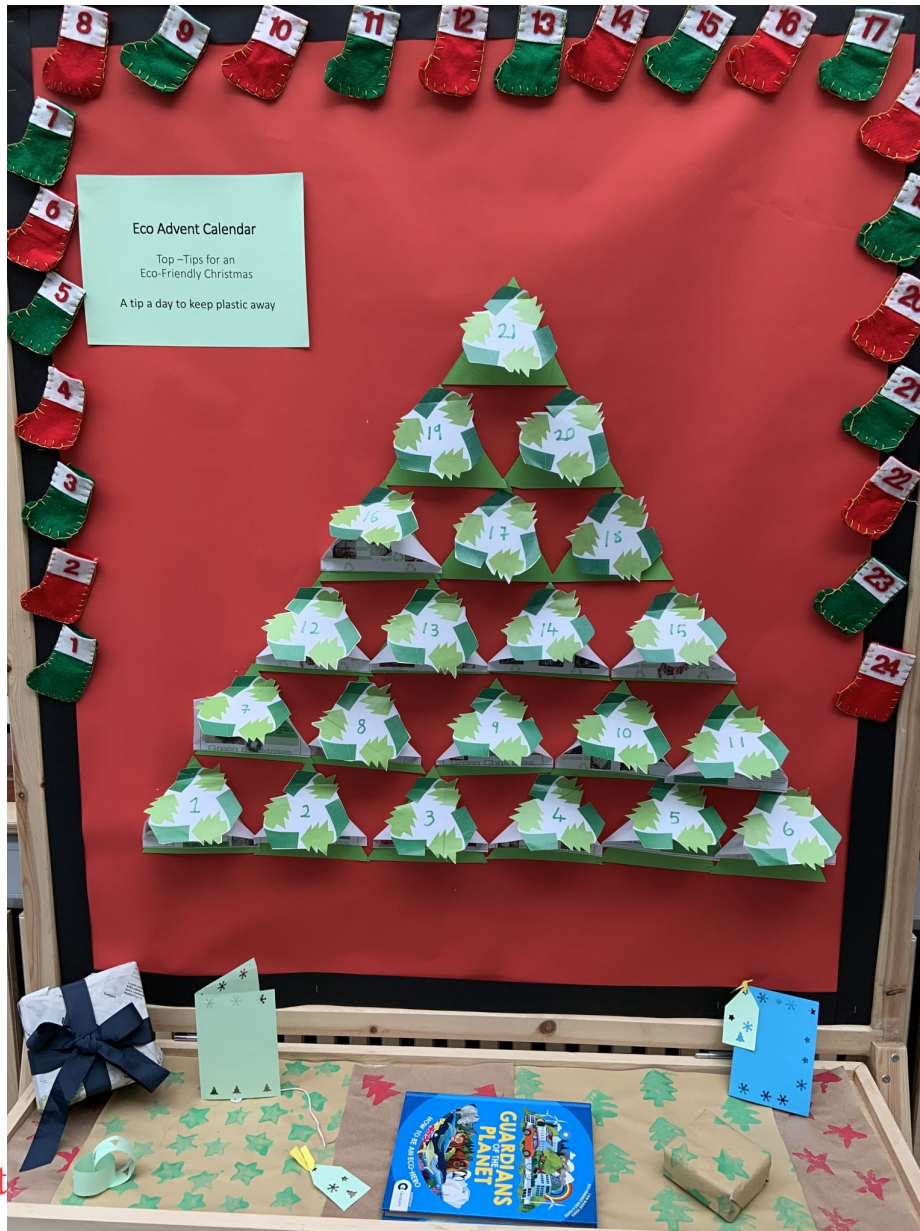

## Eco Advent

Speaking of Advent, the School's Eco Committee (Year 7 and 8 pupils), and the Green Team (Year 5 and 6), under the guidance of Miss Gamble, have created an Eco Advent Calendar which is proudly displayed in The Hub. Each day of Advent is celebrated with a different tip on how to enjoy a more environmentally friendly Christmas with the catchy title, 'A Tip a Day to Keep Plastic Away.' Advice includes: making your own mince pies instead of buying supermarket pies which are wrapped in plastic; consider renting a real Christmas tree which can be returned to the farm and re-planted; avoid wrapping paper containing plastic and glitter (which is a micro-plastic) – decorate with brown paper or newspaper instead.

## Pre Prep Nativities

Angels, shepherds, wise men and a very special baby were in the spotlight at the Foundation nativity play on Wednesday morning. Parents, grandparents and friends gathered in Ashburton

Hall as our youngest took to the stage to recreate the Christmas story. From charming songs to delightful costumes and a number of amusing off-script moments, there was barely a dry-eye in the house as the most famous story of all concluded with a rousing rendition of *We Wish You a Merry Christmas*.

In the afternoon it was the turn of Year 2 to delight their audience with a highly polished re-telling of the traditional Russian folk-tale, *Baboushka*. This was an atmospheric and ambitious production and our pupils certainly rose to the occasion. I was particularly struck by the confidence with which the children sang together and delivered their lines.
