It was wonderful to see the children enjoy the thrill of a quiz, played out in a friendly and competitive manner using a clever electronic buzzer and scoring system. We didn't win (our two teams came 4th and 5th) but according to the Quiz Club host, our teams scores may be high enough, when compared to others across the country, to qualify for the national final – we shall see. More importantly, everyone had a great time, including the many parents who came to support the event. Thank you very much to Miss Dow for arranging the quiz and coordinating our teams so well.

2RB Assembly

There were some powerful and knowledgeable messages in the 2RB assembly this week. The pupils had researched the environmental crisis caused by plastic and were able to clearly state an astonishing and, quite frankly, shocking series of facts and figures about the impact of plastic waste on the environment. They pointed out that if we keep disposing of plastic at current levels, in thirty years' time (or by the time our Foundation pupils are just 35 years old) there will be more plastic in the sea than fish. In true Pre Prep style they had even found a charming song, '3 is the magic number' to help everyone **R**educe **R**euse and **R**ecycle their plastic.
