On Wednesday evening we had the pleasure of hearing our Senior Singers lead Evensong in Liverpool Cathedral. The beautiful sound of our choir reverberating around the UK's largest Cathedral was magical and a memory we will treasure. Well, Giles Gilbert Scott was responsible for designing both the traditional red telephone box and Liverpool Cathedral, so one of his smallest designs is housed in his largest!

The next day saw an exhilarating trip around the British Music Experience, an interactive celebration of the history of pop music which got many of the tourists dancing, as you can see from the photos! This was followed by concerts at Birkenhead High School and St Peter's Church, Heswall at which our singers, ensembles, soloists and Concert Band performed several pieces, including a Beatles melody finalé, which was particularly well received by the Liverpoodlian audiences. Not surprisingly, all our hosts were extremely welcoming and the stunning setting of St Peter's Church, overlooking the River Dee and the Welsh mountains, was a fitting climax to a memorable day. the visits to the Beatles Museum and Museum of Liverpool, and the performances in the Metropolitan Cathedral. What a feast of music and a wonderful experience for our pupils! Buddhism Exhibition at the British Library

On Monday a group of Year 8 pupils, accompanied by Head of Humanities, Miss Dow, visited the Buddhism Exhibition, the largest of its kind, currently being held at the British Library in London. Our pupils immersed themselves in the artwork and sacred texts, many written on tree bark, palm leaves and silks, which make up this impressive exhibition.

Somebody Swallowed Stanley!

2JJ charmed and educated pupils, staff and parents on Wednesday morning with a rhyming couplet story about Stanley, who had a most eventful day. Stanley was swallowed by a whale, who choked and spat him out, then he was picked up by a seagull and dropped. Outreach

This week we provided transport to and from St Faith's to bring Year 3 and 4 pupils from Park Street and Babraham Primary Schools so that they could enjoy, along-side our own pupils, a talk from author Andy Shepherd. We also provided a coach service to bring Year 5 pupils from Harston and Newton Primary School to St Faith's for a STEM day. Our visiting pupils enjoyed Engineering, Computing, Maths and Science lessons led by Heads of Department in our



specialist facilities. Clearly everyone gained much from their experiences and we very much look forward to welcoming more local pupils to St Faith's in the future.

Arm Visit

The Eco committee welcomed current parent and Head of Sustainability at Arm, Dominic Vergine, for lunch on Monday. Mr Vergine spent an hour discussing a number of Arm's projects. The pupils were fascinated by a prototype tablet which is intended for use by healthcare workers in remote and disadvantaged parts of the world where the population is frequently unable to read or write but who would be able to use a finger print scanner. The news that Arm are developing a drone to monitor the health of whales by collecting samples of 'whale snot' did little to dampen the enthusiasm of our pupils, who then had a chance to grill Mr Vergine with questions including, 'How do you prioritise sustainability projects?' and 'How do you deal with conflicts if people are not happy with sustainability changes?' Our sincere thanks to Mr Vergine for taking time out of his very busy work life to explain to our pupils the impact technology can have on improving sustainability globally.

National Handwriting Award

Those with a good memory will recall that back in June I reported St Faith's had won the 2019 SATIPS National Handwriting competition. On Monday, Amanda McLeod, one of the judges, and Kevin Sadler from Nexus, the sponsors, visited the school and met with Ryan and Pippa, both place winners in their respective age categories, to deliver the Nexus shield for the top scoring school and to congratulate them personally.
