After drawing with the Scottish champions, Cargilfield, in their first match, the boys went on to finish top of their group and then had two nerve jangling penalty flick deciders in the knock-out stages before narrowly beating Taunton in the final. We think that this team is the first to win both the U13 and U11 (two years' ago) national championships. When I spoke to Mr Thompson afterwards, he was quick to commend the resilience, determination and team spirit of the side. When I chatted to the parents they praised the quality of coaching from Mr and Mrs Thompson and Mr Welch. It is indeed true that to win a national competition such as this requires both highly talented players and coaches working together, so my sincere congratulations to everyone and thank you to our merry band of supporters who travelled all the way to the West Country to cheer on the team. It proved to be day that the boys and their parents and coaches will always remember.

National Maths Challenge Results

This week, the results of the bonus round of the National Mathematics Challenge arrived. You may remember that in November, Year 6 pupils took part in the initial round, along with 66,500 others of the same age in the UK; the top 2,500 scorers were then invited to take part in a bonus round last month. Four of our students had this honour – many congratulations to Ryan, Chenning, Henry and Alexander who all performed very well. Particularly well done to Ryan who was one of only 195 pupils to be awarded a gold medal!
