The assemblies gave me a welcome opportunity to introduce myself to the children and to remind them of some of our most important guiding principles of kindness and good manners. Despite their height and size, these Giant Redwoods, which can live for hundreds of years, actually have comparatively shallow root systems, but the trees gain their strength and support by intertwining their root systems, very much like our supportive and inclusive school environment.
