Virtual Reality and Salvador Dali



This week, the Year 8 Art Group has found inspiration in Salvador Dali's surreal paintings to create their own piece of artistry. The pupils were able to use a 3D imaging program based on one of Salvador Dali's most prestigious pieces of artwork: 'The Elephants' from 1948. With virtual headsets on, pupils dived deep into Dali's artwork, encountering something of the surreal world of his imagination.

The virtual reality experience was key to the success of the art projects, leading pupils to a greater understanding of Dali's world and work. VR also brought to life more of Dali's paintings in a fully immersive way. The whole class really enjoyed this project, as it was a new and different way of learning about an artist's most famous paintings.

Buddhism and Christianity



Some of the Year 8 classes have been completing their studies in Buddhism and Christianity with Question and Answer sessions. Via MS Teams they have welcomed virtual visitors from the Cambridge Buddhist Centre. Through interaction with our visitors, the children were able to understand more fully the symbolism of the Tibetan Thangka, a painting which they have been studying. The pupils were keen to learn more about what it means to be enlightened, and why some Buddhists choose to live a very disciplined life.

We also welcomed the Reverend Chris Lowe, vicar of St John's Church in Orchard Park, Cambridge. The pupils' thoughtful questions covered a huge range of subjects from miracles to science, to the reliability of the Bible and issues of identity. All were expertly answered and discussed by Reverend Lowe.

In the Classrooms

As well as taking part in a range of summer activities and sports, the pupils have continued to work hard in their lessons. Year 7 pupils have already begun their modern foreign language assessments and are preparing for further exams. Year 6 pupils have been considering the engineering of bridges, as well as studying symmetry in Maths, and exploring the Wars of the



Roses and the life of Henry VII in Humanities. Meanwhile I joined Year 3 pupils in the library this week as they spent time carefully selecting their next 'class reader' book – with the front runner having a distinct robot theme.

Fun with the Aztecs

Last term, Year 6 completed an independent project based on their History topic. Pupils produced either an informative poster about one aspect of Aztec life, or a board game based on the Spanish exploration and conquest of the Americas. The submissions were very varied, showing impressive creativity and careful planning, from a Columbus-themed Twister, to "Anchors and Rigging", a variation on Snakes and Ladders. Pupils really enjoyed playing their board games with their peers and sharing their eye-catching posters.

Junior Soloists' Music Festival

On Thursday it was a privilege to join an audience of parents to see some of our younger musicians performing solos. An inspiring selection of pieces and a wide range of instruments being played, made for a truly memorable morning. While the festival was not a competition, the mastery of musicianship was immediately evident and I should like to congratulate all the performers upon the wonderful quality of their recitals.







Inter-House Badminton



This week was the first time the Year 8s had been involved in an inter-house Badminton competition. The matches were played in an excellent spirt and to round off a fine event, in true Fidelian style, team captains awarded prizes for 'Most Valued Player' and 'Best Team Player'.
