The Platinum Jubilee Celebration

I hope that all our families enjoyed the extended weekend of Platinum Jubilee celebrations, whether you were attending a street party, watching the lighting of a beacon, or relaxing with friends and family.

As reported in the last newsletter, there were plenty of Jubilee events taking place at the end of last half term. During the whole school assembly focused upon the Jubilee, pupils were recorded singing the National Anthem as part of the 'Choir For The Queen' initiative. We have been told that a commemorative book and video compilation have been sent to the Queen, who will watch it in the coming days.

Following this special assembly and singing of the National Anthem, staff and pupils all gathered on the school back field to form a huge '70', an image which was photographed by a drone flown overhead. The pupils then enjoyed a festive array of Jubilee fete activities, including Tug O' War and 'Pin the Crown on the Queen' competitions. Thank you to all the staff and members of the SFPA for making the day so memorable for the whole school community. A further highlight for the school community was to see two Old Fidelians, who are now both choristers at St Paul's Cathedral School, singing at The National Service of Thanksgiving.

Wild Place Forest School

This week, Foundation thoroughly enjoyed their last 'Wild Place' Forest School sessions and were especially excited to have their parents invited to join them and to enjoy a lovely picnic lunch afterwards.

It has been noticeable how the children have grown in confidence over their sessions in the 'Wild Place' and how they have developed many of our school Learning Habits in this environment. The children have demonstrated *independence* in safely using tools. They have *collaborated* – working together to build dens and make mud pies. They have shown *creativity* in making tree spirits and engaging in imaginative role play in the mud kitchen. They have challenged themselves when tree climbing in an appropriately controlled and safe way, and in doing so they showed *ambition* and *resilience*. They also enjoyed many games of "1,2,3 Where are you?" which encourages *listening* skills and is quite clearly one of their favourite woodland games. Each session ends with the children seated with a warm drink, providing time to come together and reflect on the learning that has taken place.

Foundation Art Inspired By Nature

This week the Foundation children have also been making art inspired by the artist Andy Goldsworthy, an English sculptor, photographer, and environmentalist who produces site-specific sculptures and land art. This gave another opportunity to the children to experience the <u>learning habits</u> of <u>collaboration and creativity</u>.







Minibeasts and Wooden Bug Hotels

Continuing the theme of the natural world, Year 2 are coming towards the end of their Minibeasts topic and as the weather moves into the season of summer, they have been able to experience first-hand the wonders of the life cycle of nature. Year 2 have created their own wooden bug hotels to attract wildlife to our gardens, watched the metamorphosis of caterpillar into butterfly and planted sunflower seeds which we hope to see bloom in the summer. The children have thoroughly enjoyed the hands-on learning and excitement was particularly high on the butterfly 'release' day.

This half term, Year 4 are learning about *Living Things and their Habitats*. As part of the topic, they explored the school grounds looking for varied habitats and the animals that live there. The children were amazed by the abundance of wildlife in the school including ants, beetles,



slugs, centipedes, birds, Damselflies and the beautiful Cinnabar moth.

Year 6 Cambridgeshire Schools Maths Challenge

On Tuesday afternoon, St Faith's was delighted to host its annual Year 6 Maths Challenge. Pupils from 27 local schools attended and Ashburton Hall was buzzing with mathematical activity and friendly competition all afternoon.

Working in pairs, pupils took part in a variety of mathematical challenges, with three rounds of questions and a final puzzle at the end. Their task was to solve a variety of problems for a points tally. Bonus marks were awarded for completion of all the questions in a particular round. Over 50 teams competed in the challenge, with four teams coming from St Faith's. All our teams performed impressively well, with two pupils topping the St Faith's leader board and coming in 5th place overall with an impressive 290 points. Thank you to our Head of Maths, Mrs Rainsford for organising our hosting of the competition, and staff of the Maths department for



supporting the pupils.

Soloists' Music Festival for Seniors

Yesterday, musicians from Year 6, 7 and 8 took part in the Soloists' Music Festival. Notably this was a Festival rather than a competition, where our musicians were able to perform in front of an appreciative and supportive audience. Adjudicating the Festival, we were delighted to welcome Mr Wingfield, Director of Music at The Perse School, Cambridge. The children gave recitals across a range of instruments and drew upon an impressively expansive and diverse musical repertoire, spanning early modern, through to contemporary music. Mr Wingfield commended the pupils not only upon their accomplished musical skills, but also their understanding and warm communication of the pieces they played. Well done to all our participants – it was a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon.

Year 4 Parent Forum and Tours

On Tuesday, parents of Year 4 pupils were invited to a Forum to learn about the transition from Year 4 to Year 5. Ahead of a presentation from staff, Year 8 House Captains showed parents around the parts of the school in which their children would be taught from Year 5, and answered questions on the way. With their unfailing politeness and assured approach to their task as school guides, our House Captains were perfect advocates for a St Faith's education.

Year 7 and 8 Singles Tennis Tournaments

The Year 7 and 8 girls and boys took to the courts at Latham Road on Monday for their singles tournaments.
