Let me begin by showing you how The Hub was officially opened last Friday by Professor Lord Mair, former Head of Engineering at Cambridge University. The ingenious way in which the plaque was revealed was designed and constructed by Year 8 pupils, with a little help from Dr Hoyle.

Approximately 100 people came along to celebrate the opening of this new facility. Old Fidelians, staff, governors, the design team, contractors and supporters from local engineering institutions toured the new rooms and mingled over a glass of wine. It was the perfect opportunity for me to thank everyone who played a part in its construction, particularly our Bursar, Richard Brent.

I was also able to explain how The Hub is already enhancing the children's education. The large ground floor indoor space links the Engineering, Science, Computing, Maths and Art and Design Departments. The Science Laboratories and Science Prep Room have been enlarged and refurbished. There is a spacious Project Deck on the first floor that links the Engineering Design Suite and the Art and Design Workshops, and on the top floor there is a glass-roofed room and outdoor terrace that will soon be used as an observatory.

As I said to our guests on Friday, The Hub has been planned to promote the cross pollination of ideas and skills across subjects and to help us develop young people with flexible and creative minds - so important for the future.
