Castle Fine Art Gallery Art Competition

You may recall from a previous newsletter that two weeks' ago, Year 8 pupils visited The Castle Fine Art Gallery in the Grand Arcade. The children were given a tour of the gallery, learnt about the range of artwork created by the contemporary artists and were given the task of creating their own piece of art in response to the work of an artist which inspired them.

On Tuesday afternoon, the pupils returned to the gallery to present their work and discuss their projects. The winner of the competition was Sam H, whose vibrant, colourful and abstract cityscape, painted on a foil surface with acrylic paints, was inspired by the large scale paintings of Paul Kenton. Natasha R and Dominic A were also prize winners; their interpretations of the artwork of Bob Dylan and Richard Rowan were highly commended by the Gallery. As the winner of the competition, Sam will have his artwork framed and displayed alongside Paul Kenton's paintings in the Castle Fine Art Gallery for everyone in the Cambridge community to see!

AstraZeneca Visit

Year 6 were given a fascinating glimpse into the world of drug discovery and development by a team of four Scientists from AstraZeneca, including Dr Menelas Pangalos, EVP and Global Head BioPharmaceuticals Research and Development who is responsible for AstraZeneca's pharmaceutical research worldwide and - far more importantly - is a St Faith's parent! The workshop linked very well with the pupils' recent Science lessons on cell biology and provided a great opportunity to extend their knowledge and see how it is applied in real life. Pupils raced against a robot to test chemical properties and worked in teams to build chiral compounds. The complex chemistry was clearly explained by our visitors and the practical hands-on activities gave pupils a clear understanding of the medicine development process which takes, in most cases, at least 14 years. Not surprisingly, our Year 6 pupils loved this special lesson and were left inspired. Many thanks to the AstraZeneca team and particularly Dr Pangalos who had flown overnight from Washington to help deliver this workshop to the Year 6 children.

Visit to Marshall Aerospace

Year 4 had a fantastic visit to Marshall on Thursday, an event organised by Cambridge LaunchPad. Our pupils were encouraged to engage in and understand the engineering process

as they worked in teams to build motor powered cars, experiment with parachutes to protect a water balloon and build chariots strong enough to transport teammates across the hangar. The children's problem solving skills were further tested as they worked together to save a nuclear reactor from going into meltdown. Thankfully, all teams managed to avert disaster and safely move the nuclear waste across the assault course. Pupils also had a tour of the site and a visit to the fire station. A truly inspiring day was had by all!
